A regular meeting of the Caribou City Council was held 7:00 p.m. on Monday, March 25, 2013 in Council Chambers with the following members present: Mayor Gary Aiken, Deputy Mayor Kenneth G. Murchison, Jr., David Martin, Philip McDonough II, Joan L. Theriault, and David R. Genthner, Sr.

Austin Bleess, City Manager and Tony Mazzucco, Assistant City Manager were present.

Department Managers: William Tasker, Director Chamber of Commerce; Scott Susi, Fire Chief; and Kathleen A. Mazzuchelli, Superintendent of Parks & Recreation were present.

Natalie Bazinet, representing the Aroostook Republican and Time Warner covered the meeting.

Council Agenda Item #1: Public Input

Steve Farnham, Executive Director for Aroostook Area Agency on Aging, requested that the Council reconsider the agency's 2013 funding request. The City's adopted Expense Budget does not include any funding for Aroostook Area Agency on Aging. In the past year, they have provided services for approximately 400 Caribou citizens valued at nearly \$603,000. One out of every five Caribou residents fit the agency's primary service group of individuals over the age of 60. The Board's policy is to provide services only in communities that grant financial support. In the past year, the Meals on Wheels program served 71 Caribou residents by providing approximately 9000 meals. Mr. Farnham listed other services provided by the agency. Since 1982, the requested financial amount has been \$7,253. Council members asked several questions.

Larry Pelletier, Caribou resident, asked questions about school budgets, whether there was a hiring freeze, and the proposed missile defense base. Mayor Aiken answered Mr. Pelletier's questions.

Council Agenda Item #5: Missile Defense Base

Motion made by P. McDonough, seconded by D. Martin, to sign a letter to be sent to Secretary of Defense Hagel expressing the Council's support for the location of a Missile Defense Base in the Caribou area. (5 yes) So voted.

Council Agenda Item #6: City Fee Schedule

Since the last Council meeting, the Recreation Commission has met and reviewed the proposed fee schedule. The Commission has developed their own fee schedule and Chair Sue White reviewed their recommendations:

Organized Program

Residents Non-Residents

\$10 per child per program or; \$25 per child per program \$50 per child annual pass \$125 per child per year

Fees for Outdoor Pool

Residents Non-Residents

\$1 per day for general swim or \$20 \$1 per day for general swim season pass \$25 per child per lesson session

Combination Pool Passes

\$25 for one session of lessons and general swim season \$35.00 for two sessions of lessons and general swim season

Program Assistance Fund (scholarships)

The guidelines for eligibility will be developed around the State/Local guidelines for free lunch. Assistance will be limited to one \$20 stipend per child/per year.

Projected revenues are \$9,000 for Recreation programs and \$5,000 for the swimming pool.

Manager Bleess reviewed the other proposed fee changes. Mayor Aiken suggested a \$10.00 fee for a PDF version of the Commitment Book.

Motion made by K. Murchison, seconded by D. Martin, to accept the proposed City Fee Schedule as presented with one exception, fee for the PDF version of the Commitment Book will change to \$10.00. (4 yes, 1 no, P. McDonough) So voted.

Council Agenda Item #7: Sale of Tax Acquired Property

Recently the City had placed several tax acquired properties out to bid. No bids were received for three properties located at Map 18, Lot 31-53, Map 12, Lot 5A, and Map 31, Lot 24. Since then the City has been approached by individuals willing to purchase the lots.

Map 18, Lot 31-53 minimum bid: \$1,000 offer: \$1,500 Map 12, Lot 5A minimum bid: \$30,000 offer: \$20,000 Map 31, Lot 24 minimum bid: \$6,000 offer: \$6,000

Motion made by D. Martin, seconded by P. McDonough, to sell Map 18, Lot 31-53 and Map 31, Lot 24 for the offered amounts and to re-advertise Map 12 Lot 5A with a minimum bid of \$20,000. (5 yes) So voted.

Council Agenda Item #8: Tax Acquired Property Policy

Mayor Aiken suggested amending Section 6.3 to include language allowing the City Manager to negotiate a sale price as long as it is not below the advertised minimum bid. Councilor McDonough requested amending the policy to require the use of a "check list" so Council will know when they receive the list of properties that all necessary departments have reviewed the proposed selling of the property. Councilor Martin questions why individuals are living in tax acquired property. Mayor Aiken offered that it is due to the cost of eviction.

Motion made by D. Martin, seconded by P. McDonough, to approve the Tax Acquired Property Policy as amended. (5 yes) So voted.

Council Agenda Item #11: Purchase of Police Squad Vehicle

The City of Caribou has been given an opportunity to bid on a 2013 Ford Explorer Police Interceptor. This former demo vehicle is fully equipped, painted, has \$4,000 of additional equipment, and only 12,000 miles. For 2013, the Police Department is scheduled to replace a cruiser. The cost of a new cruiser is approximately \$32,000. Manager Bleess answered Council questions.

Motion made by P. McDonough, seconded by J. Theriault, to allow Griffith Ford to bid up to \$22,000 on behalf of the City of Caribou for a 2013 demo Ford Explorer Police Interceptor with the money to come out of the Capital Reserve Account. (5 yes) So voted.

Council Agenda Item #12: April 8, 2013 Council Workshop

Mayor Aiken wants the Council to have the opportunity to speak with the individuals who apply for the vacant Council position.

Motion made by P. McDonough, seconded by J. Theriault, on April 8th, to meet with Council candidates at 5:00 p.m. in executive session and to hold a Council Workshop at 6:00 p.m. to discuss the Downtown TIF and Credit Enhancement Agreements. (5 yes) So voted.

Council Agenda Item #13: Rules of Procedure – Addressing the Caribou City Council

Motion made by D. Martin, seconded by P. McDonough, to amend the current Rules of Procedure – Addressing the Caribou City Council by adding at the end of 1-a and 2-b "unless allowed more time by Chair". (5 yes) So voted.

The City of Caribou recognizes its employees as its most valuable asset. The Caribou City Council, being ultimately responsible for the safety and protection of city employees, hereby establishes a goal of providing a safe and healthy workplace for all of its employees. The City recognizes that safety conscious employees are a key to meeting this goal, and hereby call for the development and implementation of safety programs aimed at training and educating employees and ultimately providing an accident free and healthy work environment.

To help meet this goal, the city will provide necessary personal protective equipment and training in the use of this equipment, designed to reduce exposure to potential hazards, allocating resources as needed to rectify hazardous conditions.

Whereas the City Manager, Department Heads and Departmental Safety Committee Members have direct control and oversight responsibility for safety programs, it is the responsibility of each employee to follow all safe work rules and procedures. If an employee is unsure of how to perform a particular task safely, they should not proceed until they have received instructions from their Supervisor or authorized designee. Each employee is obligated to report unsafe working conditions to the safety committee, their immediate supervisor, or the Assistant City Manager/City Manager. It is the responsibility of Safety Committee members and each Supervisor to monitor and assist employees in the safe performance of their duties. Safe work behavior and attitudes are an expected part of each employee's job performance.

This mission statement will be reviewed and revised, as needed, to allow City of Caribou employees to meet the mutually beneficial goals of zero workplace injuries and illnesses and a healthy and productive team.

Ordinance 2-2013 is a technical change ordinance. It gives the Planning Board the freedom to determine when they hold their monthly meetings. It also changes the quorum from three people to four people since they are a seven person board.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 13-820 4 (A) (1) AND SECTION 13-820 4 (A) (3) OF CHAPTER 13 THE LAND USE ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF CARIBOU

Short Title: Technical Changes for Planning Board Administration.

The City Council of the City of Caribou, County of Aroostook, State of Maine, pursuant to the requirements of the City of Caribou Charter, Section 2.11 (1) does ordain the following:

Section 1: Section 13-820 4 (A) (1) of Chapter 13 is hereby repealed.

Section 2: Section 13-820 4 (A) (1) of Chapter 13 shall read:

1. Regular meetings of the Planning Board will be scheduled during the Annual Meeting. The meeting shall be at the Caribou Municipal Building or other suitable meeting place. The Chair may schedule special meetings on 24 hours notice to the Planning Board members, City Manager, City Council Chair, CEO, and the media. If there is no business scheduled at least seven (7) calendar days before the meeting the Assistant City Manager, in consultation with the CEO, may cancel the meeting and shall inform the Planning Board, City Manager, and the media of such.

Section 3: Section 13-820 4 (A) (3) of Chapter 13 is amended as follows:

No official business may be conducted without a quorum present. A quorum shall consist of three (3) four (4) members. It shall not include anyone who cannot participate due to a conflict of interest. "Conflict of interest" means direct or indirect pecuniary interest, which shall include primary benefit to any member of the person's immediate family, their employer, or the employer of any member of the person's immediate family. It shall also include a situation where the Board member, by reason of their interest, is placed in a situation of temptation to serve their own personal interest, instead of the public's interest. Any question of whether a member shall be disqualified from voting on a particular matter shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present, except the member challenged.

This ordinance, being introduced on March 25, 2013 and a public hearing being held on April 8, 2013 was duly passed by the City Council of the City of Caribou, Maine, this 8th day of April 2013.

Re: Rules of Procedure – Addressing the Caribou City Council

As directed by Council I have modified the Rule of Procedure – Addressing the Caribou City Council. The proposed draft is below. Council

Revised: April 8, 2012

Rule of Procedure - Addressing the Caribou City Council

Pursuant to Caribou Charter Section 2.10 (a)(i)(b) There shall be a time slot of at least 15 minutes available at the beginning of each regularly scheduled meeting, for input from residents or tax payers of Caribou. The Council will maintain a Rule of Procedure to allow public comment on agenda and nonagenda items at the start of each Council meeting. All requests will be honored.

Procedure:

- 1. Individuals wishing to address the Council shall do so during the time period established and in a manner as described:
 - a) Individuals addressing the Council shall give their name and address and shall limit their statements to not more than five minutes. The Council Chair, at his/her discretion, may allow more time to a speaker.
 - b) Individuals wishing to appear on the Council agenda to address the council shall contact the City Manager no later than 5:00 pm on the Thursday before the Council meeting they wish to appear on the agenda. This is not a requirement to address the Council during public input.

Nature of Address:

All comments need to be addressed to the Council at large and not to specific members. Questions shall be asked of individual Council members only through the presiding officer. Discussion will be limited to Council members and the person recognized as having the floor. Any person making personal, impertinent or slanderous remarks, or who becomes boisterous or exhibits inappropriate behavior while addressing the Council may be instructed to leave the meeting by the presiding officer.



Date: April 8, 2013 Re: 20 Collins St

City staff has begun to look at a number of slum/blight issues around the city. The building located at 20 Collins St is in very bad shape and needs to be demolished.

There are two main options that the council can consider.

The first option would be for city staff to attempt to work with the current owner to have them demolish the building or for them to sign a consent agreement for the city to demolish the building and for the owner to pay the costs. If the owner is unwilling to do this we would want Council Authorization to authorize city attorney to file a suit in Superior Court to have this property decaled as a Dangerous Building under Title 17,§ 2851. That would compel the owner to demolish the building.

The other option would be for the city to take over the property and demo the building on our own.

Staff would obviously like to see city expenses at a minimum for this project, but there is a benefit to removing the blight even if there is some expense. The plan being recommended by staff is to send one more letter to the owner giving him 10 days to sign an agreement and after that turning the case over to the city attorney to file with the courts.

Re: Maine Military Authority Lease

As Council is aware Maine Military Authority has stopped using the 60 Access Highway building. On March 15, 2013 they returned the keys and officially surrendered possession of the building. The lease agreement, Section 20, stipulates an automatic lease renewal of five years unless otherwise notified in writing. No such notification exists, and the lease automatically renewed on December 1, 2010.

To date the city has not received rental payments two years, December 1, 2010- November 30, 2012. That total is \$35,000, or \$17,500 per year. If we were to bill them for the partial year, December 1, 2012 – March 15, 2013, it would be another \$5,034.25.

Under Section 9 of the lease agreement MMA is also responsible for maintaining "the premises including the plumbing, heating system, roof and outside walls and windows." There was a Property Condition Assessment done in November 2005, and updated in August 2012 which is the basis for the repair work necessary. Those repairs and the anticipated costs of them, as estimated by contractors, is as follows:

I am asking for Council authorization to utilize the City Attorney and the legal process to recover the funds necessary to complete the repairs and the back rent. Before we do that I will send one more letter informing MMA of our intent to send this to the city attorney.

Re: May 27, 2013 Council Meeting

Since the May 27, 2013 Council meeting falls on Memorial Day I'm wondering if Council would like to cancel the second meeting in May.

According to Charter Section 5(6)(d) "the City Manager will finalize the complete City Budget for the current year including all three elements: expense, capital expense, and income on or before the 31st of May each year."

There is no requirement for approval of the City Council. So that could be done in June. The taxation rate must be set by June 30th, which this year falls on a Sunday.

It's also my understanding that historically there is only one council meeting a month in July and August. If council would like to do that again we can set the schedule for those months tonight as well.
