Did you know that a successful grant application starts with well-constructed planning documents? Over the next year, the City of Caribou & Northern Maine Development Commission (NMDC) will be working to complete the 2024 – 2034 Comprehensive Plan – a roadmap for the next ten years. What do you as a business owner see as important priorities to consider?

Additionally, the City is working with the Maine Department of Transportation, TYLin Group Civil Engineering and Rasor Landscape Architecture on a Village Partnership Initiative that will look for solutions to make Caribou's downtown more walkable and bikeable. What are your ideas?

The Northern Border Regional Commission Catalyst Grant provides funding for a Riverfront Master Plan. NMDC is also working with the City of Caribou to execute this grant funding. What would you like to see along the Aroostook River?

Examples of eligible projects:


- Repairs to exterior siding

### Maine Eclipse 2024: Staff Up & Stock Up

It is time to **STAFF UP & STOCK UP** for the week of April 5–8, 2024. Aroostook County will have the attention of the nation as the moon moves in front of the sun for the Maine Eclipse.

#### Key phrase: We Must Staff Up & Stock Up for the Maine Eclipse

Many visitors will come to The County as both overnight visitors and day-trippers. Festivals and entertainment from April 5-8 are planned to entertain and feed the visitors whether it is clear skies or April showers. Only those in the Line of Totality will experience total darkness. Caribou is in the Line of Totality and will be dark for over 2 minutes.

A GAS STATION may consider filling their tanks in advance. A TOW TRUCK COMPANY may have extra staff on call. A sit-down RESTAURANT may consider a buffet line or to-go grab bags. A CIVIC ORGANIZATION may consider organizing a ticketed event fundraiser or community dinner. A RETAILER may consider unique merchandise or adding additional staff to reduce long lines. A HOTEL may consider parking lot signage to deter illegal parking. A FOOD TRUCK may consider opening and setting up earlier in a month they typically don't operate and place their food order well in advance.

'Star Parks' is the language being used to describe viewing areas. These areas are where the municipalities and businesses want visitors to congregate safely to view the Maine Eclipse. These areas should include paved areas cleared of snow, trash receptacles, and restroom facilities (none of these things are required). This will keep motorists out of private parking lots, the soft shoulders of roads, and in a safe planned area – tell them where to go and they will. In Caribou, the 'Star Park' will be at the Wellness & Recreation Center at 55 Bennett Drive from 12 noon to 6:00 pm with concessions available.

#### Marketing & Promotion:

Aroostook County has created <u>this website hub</u> linking to area events and websites and on <u>visitmaine.com here</u>. Marketing materials that are reaching viewers tell them Aroostook County is the best place to view the Maine Eclipse, the event is April 5-8, they will find star parks for viewing, they should expect chilly weather and soft soils to be cautious of.

If your business is hosting an event like live music for the eclipse, or your civic organization or club is hosting a dinner for the eclipse, or if you created cool merchandise or are having a sale at your store – please let the contacts below know.

### Long Ago in Caribou - Remembering Businesses of Days Past

City Manager Penny Thompson asked her husband to tell a story about a former Caribou business and this is what he shared:

Living on the family farm on the Madawaska Road, we were fortunate to have plenty of fresh cream to make butter and livestock that when butchered supplied us with enough meat. Since we did not get our first International Harvester freezer on the farm until the early 1950s, you may wonder how we stored the farm's abundance. In the days before home freezers, the bigger stores had large walk-in freezers with lockers that customers could rent. When I was a young boy, I would travel to town with my Grammie Idella Thompson on Saturday afternoon and a stop was always made to Dan Daniel's store on Sweden Street where Grammie rented a locker in his freezer. Along with beef, pork and venison, butter could be stored to use during the 2-3 months that cows would dry up and there would be no cream to make butter. On one such trip to town, Grammie Idella and I arrived at the store and were greeted by one of the many friendly clerks. A butcher escorted us into the freezer and as Grammie used her key to access our locker, he said good-bye and closed the freezer door. Grammie Idella took out the roasts and hamburg that she wanted for the week and deposited her surplus butter. We prepared to leave but the door was locked! It was several freezing cold minutes before the butcher returned and said, "Mrs. Thompson, are you still here?" to which Grammie answered, "Yes! We did not know how to unlock the freezer door." The kind butcher then explained that all we needed to do was push the large round wooden button on the inside of the door. We made many trips to the lockers before we had freezers at home and that was the only time that we got locked inside ... however, there was that one time that Grammie Idella and I got locked into the vault of the Aroostook Trust Bank but that is a story for another time!
